COVID-19 Update

As this newsletter went to press in mid-June, government directives and health authorities were allowing churches to gradually reopen, with strict guidelines for social distancing, sanitizing, etc.

Gedatsu Church is carefully considering whether or not to resume in-person gatherings at our churches. At this time, the church is taking the following steps to ensure the health and safety of our members and the public:

- Our churches remain closed
- All regularly scheduled in-person services and activities are suspended until further notice
- Exception: Personal consultations with ministers and special services – such as ancestor/family blessings and memorial services – are permitted under the following conditions:
 - Gatherings are limited to no more than 10
 - Services/consultations by appointment only
 - Participants complete a health-screening questionnaire and comply with health rules
- No final decision yet on Fall Festival and Autumn Moon Festival

Remember, high-risk populations remain those who are:

- o Older than 65
- With a compromised health condition
- III, have a temperature, cough, etc., or
- Caring for the sick in any way

Gedatsu Church is continually monitoring the situation and will share the latest information with you as decisions are made.

Also, as situations change, watch for announcements from the L.A. and Sacramento regional boards concerning your local branch church.

How Our Holy Tea Blessing Plaques Are Produced

Preserving a Sacred Practice

Our founder, **Gedatsu Kongo**, introduced the practice of holy tea blessing a year after founding the Gedatsu Church in 1929. He instructed his followers to pour holy tea over plaques on which he inscribed the Holy *Goho* and the names of departed souls. By doing so, he said, the spirits could be consoled and rest peacefully.

Today, more than 90 years later, the *Chosatsu-bu*, or Plaque Manufacturing Department, at the *Gedatsu-kai* Headquarters in Tokyo carries on the sacred tradition. A dedicated team of nine men and women is responsible for producing the wooden holy tea plaques, which totaled nearly 90,000 last year.

For decades, the plaques, milled from fir trees in the Kansai region of Japan, were laboriously written and stamped by hand. In 2003, the entire process was transformed and automated through computer technology and digital printing – enabling a single plaque to be produced in just 15 minutes.

The peak production period for plaques is in November – in anticipation of the New Year, when members replace their plaques. Other busy periods are in July, prior to the Japanese *Obon* tradition, as well as in April and September, when the staff produces *Manbu Kuyo* plaques and certificates.

Above, left to right, the plaque manufacturing process begins with data entry of the various plaques requested from the application forms. The data is then printed on the wooden plaques. The Holy Goho – copied from the Founder's original writing is stamped in red ink onto each plaque by a member of the Okano family.

Bottom, left to right, before the plaques are shipped out, a special prayer ceremony, called *gohoraku*, is performed to sanctify the plaques as holy instruments of blessing. The ceremony is performed twice a month – and three times a month during the busy production season. In bottom right photo, each plaque is respectfully blessed one by one.

New Series: Gedatsu Q&A

I am pleased to introduce a new study series entitled "Gedatsu Q&A." As its title implies, this series will present the basics of Gedatsu in simple question-and-answer format. Its purpose is to demonstrate the application of Gedatsu doctrine and principles in our everyday activities.

Although the Gedatsu teaching was originally established in Japan for Japanese citizens nearly a century ago, I believe the Gedatsu teaching is universal and relevant for everyone, regardless of culture, tradition or nationality. I hope to convey my understanding of Gedatsu to Americans today. Along, the way, if you have any questions, please send them to me and I will try to answer them.

I hope this new series will help you to deepen your understanding of Gedatsu and will aid you in living a fulfilling and positive life.

Q Who established the Gedatsu Church?

A Gedatsu Church was established in Japan in 1929 by **Gedatsu Kongo**. Gedatsu Kongo is the posthumous name of the founder of the church, **Seiken Okano**, who was born in 1881, the second son in the Okano family. Prior to establishing the Gedatsu Church, he worked in various stations in life – apprenticeship with a liquor store, textile business, shipping business, etc. – experiencing many ups and downs.

After these experiences, at age 48, he underwent the awakening of his religious consciousness. He established the Gedatsu faith to embrace a nonsectarian spiritual philosophy, which advocated the practical application of religious principles to promote the happiness and welfare of all people. Gedatsu Kongo passed away in 1948.

The seed of Gedatsu was planted in American soil during WWII, and Gedatsu Church U.S.A. was established in California in 1950. The propagation of Gedatsu in America is primarily attributed to the pioneering efforts of two dedicated disciples of Gedatsu Kongo: **Kenyu Kiyota** and **Eizan Kishida**.

Q What was the Founder's intention in establishing the Gedatsu path?

A When Founder Gedatsu Kongo established the Gedatsu Church in 1929, there were myriad religions throughout the world, and religious scriptures and doctrines had been thoroughly studied and discussed by that time.

Then why did Gedatsu Kongo establish the Gedatsu path under those circumstances? Simply stated, it is because he was not satisfied with the status quo of religions at that time. Although a variety of religious teachings were available, many religions were dogmatic and in conflict with one another. Religious teachings were not fully practiced for people's happiness and welfare.

Master Gedatsu Kongo's earnest desire was to break the walls of religions and open the universal truth to all people for their happiness and welfare. For that purpose, he established the Gedatsu path as a nonsectarian religious study.

Q What does "Gedatsu" mean?

A Gedatsu is originally Buddhist terminology, literally meaning "to undo" or "to be freed from." We humans are usually bound by our egos, thoughts, values, ideologies or concepts. Our biased thoughts and attitudes create conflicts with others, sufferings, anxieties, etc.

By self-reflection and "undoing" these egotistical thoughts and attitudes, we can create harmony, peace of mind and well-being in our lives and achieve a more harmonious, peaceful and compassionate world for everyone. This is the basic teaching of Gedatsu.

Founder Gedatsu Kongo also used the word "Gedatsu" in a broader sense of "appreciation and gratitude." This is because, when you discard your egotistical thoughts and attitudes in life and live with appreciation and gratitude, you will be able to attain peace and happiness.



OUR GEDATSU STUDY

Today, as we offer prayers for the peaceful repose of unrested spirits related to the pandemic, we can find particular relevance to our current situation in the following article, which was written by Bishop Kishida 65 years ago.

Neglected and Unrested Spirits of the Universe By Bishop Eizan Kishida

Dynamic Analysis of Illness through Gedatsu

Neglected and unrested spirits tend to drift unpredictably like an air current without any relationship to time and place. If the psychodynamics of these spirits were examined more closely, it may be revealed that these forces drift into an area according to certain sequence, but my present findings do not indicate this.

Rather, I believe that when a multitude of people perish from the effects of a natural disaster or a major war, the prevalence of a disease or illness affecting the remaining populace is often the manifestation of the sufferings of the unrested spirits of those who died in such disasters.

Immediately following the conclusion of World War I, the virulent epidemic of influenza, which started in Spain and spread throughout the world, tragically accounted for many deaths. The number of people who died from this virulent influenza, known as the Spanish flu, greatly outnumbered those who died in the war.

Spiritual Source of Pandemics, Crises

In this instance, it is quite clear that this pandemic, which engulfed the nations of the world, was the manifestation of the unrested spirits of those people who perished in the war.

As long as medicine progresses in its research for bodily cures, it may be possible to counteract and prevent the spread of germs and bacteria, thus saving mankind from such virulent illnesses.

But even if the illness is checked from the aftermath of wars and natural disasters, various unexplainable social incidents and problems may occur as if they were provoked by unusual stimulus. When this phenomenon is analyzed from an international viewpoint, the reasons for the Korean conflict, the Indo-French problem, and the regimented way of life imposed upon the people of China by the Communist regime, can easily be imagined.





The Spanish flu of 1918 was one of the deadliest pandemics in human history. Seeming to come from nowhere in the waning days of World War I, it spread through a war-ravaged world like wildfire. In a matter of months, a third of the world's population was infected, and 50 to 100 million people died.

The crisis of East and West Berlin in Europe, and even in areas of the world which did not directly participate in World War II, like parts of Africa and South America, is accounted for by the tense war-like feelings prevailing in these parts of the world, which consequently produced many innocent casualties.

This was the world situation immediately following World War II.

These situations may be briefly explained as the outgrowth of natural and international political conflict and evolution, but why must there be such tensions in the world today?

Modern man and the present-day politicians acknowledge the fact that they are civilized people, but nevertheless, they often create irrevocable situations in states of anger and uncontrolled emotions.

Lack of Sincere Tribute, Prayer for War Dead

If we were to analyze the cause of these actions, it lies in the unrested and neglected spirits of the war dead who perished in the name of their country. They are manifesting their disappoints and objects to the surviving people who have forgotten the sacrifices of the war dead.

It is not surprising to find that once people have survived the perils of wars, their personal greed will return and their instincts for self-preservation will direct their normal thoughts and actions.

There is nothing wrong with these actions, but what one should not forget to do is the sincere offering of a memorial service to the unfortunate war dead. The fulfillment of this memorial service should not just be in the form of an elaborate public ceremony, but rather in the personal offering of the memorial service from deep within one's heart. When an individual can cultivate such a spiritual state and render proper tribute to the war dead, the mind and heart of man can possess more beauty.

It is often thought that the war dead have all received elaborate funeral services and are all interred in their native land. However, this is only a mere formality. There is only a small percentage of the war dead whose actual remains have been interred in a proper cemetery.

In the midst of war, there are many casualties whose bodily remains are lost and unrecoverable and those who were given sea burials. In such cases, some personal article left by the deceased is interred in place of the actual bodily remains at the cemetery. Under the circumstances of war, such conditions are unavoidable.

Spirits Remain Unrested, Neglected

However, the spirits of the soldiers who have died in battle, resigned to the fact that they must kill or be killed, remain largely as spirits possessing vindictive feelings. In such manner, the neglected and unrested spirits of the war dead drift in a strong force.

Beside the spirits of these war dead, there are other innumerable spirits, which are unidentified and unrested. These spirits roam through the universe and are not quite discernible as to their origin.

If we consider all the countries in the world from time immemorial, there are countless numbers of such neglected and unrested spirits. These spirit forces are constantly in motion like atom particles and whenever a person comes into direct contact with one of these forces, he inevitably feels the effect.

This effect is in the form of a cold or flu. This type of flu is not just an ordinary flu, which is the direct result of an extreme climatic change but is a flu of a virulent nature accompanied by very high fever.

Moreover, this type of flu usually spreads from one house to the next very rapidly just as a vagrant would go begging from house to house. When one is attacked by this type of flu, he should immediately take the proper measures to offer holy tea blessing and prayers for the peaceful repose and comfort of the spirits.



The Grace of Being "Lucky" By Hisato Tsujimura

I've often said, "Do you want to make God laugh? Then tell Him your plans."

Well, God must have had a good laugh in 2016. Until that year, my wife, **Lori**, and I had lived in the Los Angeles and Orange County area all of our lives. Even after our children married, had children of their own and moved out of the area to Washington and Oregon, we remained in California. Our air flight bills became quite high, as Lori shared half the year with the grandchildren and the other half with me.

The year 2016 started no differently than previous years. I was working and had no plans to retire. Each week consisted of work, trips to the racetrack and church. Week in and week out for the past many years, this was our life, and I expected it to remain the same. Sure, my wife and I had many thoughts and words about moving near the grandchildren, but usually these thoughts would just come and go.

The Big Move

Then, in the middle of 2016, Lori suddenly said, "Let's move." Or . . . maybe it went, "I'm moving. If you want to come, put the house up for sale."

Two months later, we were out of the house and on our way to Portland, Oregon, where my son and family reside. We planned on staying with them until we could find a place of our own. Our stay lasted longer than it should have, but we were finally able to purchase our house in April 2017.

While we were at my son's house, sometime in late 2016, while playing with our grandchildren, Lori felt a little ball on her breast. She thought it was just a "fat ball," and since she was scheduled to have a checkup the following month, she planned to talk to her doctor of this finding.

The Big "C"

Much to our surprise, this "fat ball" turned out to be cancerous. Lori had breast cancer!

She was lucky to have discovered this "fat ball," since it may or may not have been found by the doctor during her checkup -- it was that small.

After our initial shock, the doctor laid out the schedule of treatments. Because it was found in its early stage, it would be about a year before Lori would be back to so-called "normal."

Her schedule called for six chemotherapy treatments, followed by a few weeks of rest, surgery, rest then radiation to remove any remaining cancerous cells. Her first treatment was on May 30 and lasted six hours. Thereafter, each treatment lasted between 4-5 hours and took place in three-week intervals.

The treatments were not easy for Lori. She lost more than 15 pounds. She had no appetite, her strength had diminished, and she was afraid to leave the house for any length of time, because bathroom visits came far too often and at any time.

Lori has really been a trooper through all of what has been going on. Each time at a chemo treatment, she would say how lucky she was to find the cancer in its early stage. Only six treatments!

We saw other cancer patients having to undergo far more treatments, along with its sufferings. Lori and I often discuss how lucky we were to have discovered the cancer in its early stage. How lucky we were to find this "fat ball." How lucky we were to find a place of our own. How lucky we were to find the doctors that treated the cancer.

Lucky? Or ...

Looking back, I wonder about the "luck" involved. Why did we decide to move so suddenly, when we were so hesitant before? Why was my wife playing with our grandchildren when she discovered the "fat ball"? How was she able to feel something that was so tiny and hardly detectable?

Lori's cancer was present, whether we lived in California or Oregon. But, if we had remained in California, who is to say whether we would have found this "fat ball"? Who is to say that she would have had the same treatment for this cancer in California as she had received in Oregon? Her anesthesiologist was an Asian, who understood that her needs for anesthetics were a lot less than most patients. Because of this, she was able to walk out of the recovery room an hour after her operation.

Recipe for Foil-cooked Salmon Contributed by Yoko Yamada

A healthy, delicious and easy-to-prepare meal. Ingredients are available in most Asian supermarkets.

- Sprinkle salmon fillets with salt and pepper
- Cut vegetables into bit-size pieces
- Place salmon and onion in center of foil
- Place remaining vegetables on top or beside salmon. Top salmon with butter and sprinkle with paprika.
- Wrap foil tightly around ingredients so no air can escape.
- Place foil pouches in frying pan. Add ½ cup of water and cover with tight-fitting lid.
- Cook on medium heat for 4 minutes, then low heat for 7 8 minutes. (Add water as needed to maintain steaming.)
- * Remove foil pouches to plates and open foil carefully.
- Serve with *ponzu* or soy sauce.

ロサンゼルス教会

私の車が消えた

→日は、私が現在、運転させていただいている車、RAV4を通して学ばせていただいたことをお話させていただきます。

妻の裕子がまだ七海を妊娠している頃でした。会員 さんと教会の駐車場で話をしている時、その会員さん が運転しているトヨタのハイランダーを指して、「2 人目ができたらこういう大きい3列シートの車が欲 しくなるよ」と言いました。

当時は「RAV 4 で十分ですよ」と言いましたが、子どもが大きくなってきた今は、会員さんの言葉は正しかったと思います。サクラメントなどに泊まりで出かけるときなどは荷物が多く RAV4 には収まりません。

そういうときは教会のシエナを運転させていただいて、非常にありがたないな…と感じておりますが、そういうこともあり、以前、ルディさんに「私もハイランダーみたいな車がほしいな」と言ったことをよく覚えています。

そんなある日の朝、教会に行くために私たちが住んでいたアパートの地下の駐車場に行った時、思わず「えっ」と、驚きました。前日に停めておいた場所に車がないのです。慌てて記憶を思い返しても、そこに停めたことは間違いなく、私のRAV4はどこかへ消えてしまいました。

真っ先に盗まれたと疑いましたがどうすれば良いかわからず、ルディさんに電話をすると、警察に電話をするよう言われました。

こういう時に英語が堪能ではないため少し不安になるのですが、意を決して警察に電話をし、車がなくなったことを伝えました。「車のナンバーは?」と警察の方が聞いてきました。車のナンバーを暗記していない私は、「I don't know」と言いました。すると「What does it mean you don't know?」と言われ、最終的には、「車のナンバーがわかったらもう1度かけ直してこい」と言われて電話を切られてしまいました。私では事態の収拾が難しいと判断し、ルディさんに再度電話し、助けをお願いしました。

ルディさんが来るまでの間、駐車場には教会のプリウスもありましたので、プリウスでひとまず教会に向かい、RAV4のピンクスリップなど必要情報をコピーし待っていました。ルディさんが来ると、ルディさんと一緒に私のアパートに向かい、近くの警察署に盗難車のレポートに行きました。

そこで、警察の方に言われたのは、私の車は盗まれたのではなく違反車として「Tow」(撤去)されたということでした。警察の担当者は車が保管されている場所と管理会社の電話番号を教えてくれました。私はその時点では本当に「RAV 4 が無事でよかった」と心から安心しました。そして、もらった番号に電話をし、ルディさんと一緒に引き取りに向かいました。

管理会社にて撤去費用と一泊の駐車代金計 \$220 を支払い、車を受け取りました。その時は、「盗

まれたかもしれない」という最悪のケースを想定していたので、戻ってきてよかったという気持ちでした。

ところが、戻ってきた車をよく見ると、ワイパーに 紙が挟まっていました。それは「駐車違反」の切符で \$58 を支払いなさい…というものでした。

つまり、私の住んでいるアパートの地下の駐車場に 車を止めておいたら、撤去されて、「違反切符」をもら い、合計 \$ 278 を支払ったということでした。

この時点で頭はだんだんと冷静になり、車が戻ってきたという喜びが薄れて、「なんで、アパートの駐車場に止めておいたのに Tow されて駐車違反でお金を払わなくてはいけないんだ」という怒りに変わっていきました。

では、なぜ私の車がアパートの駐車場に止めておいたのに撤去されて駐車違反の切符をきられたか…ということを説明いたします。

実は、私の車が Tow されたのは早朝なのですが、その前日は駐車場の水洗浄が実施されていました。この洗浄は駐車場を3つに分け、3つのうちの該当する1つのエリアの車は予定されている洗浄日には駐車することができません。私が帰宅したときにはまだ洗浄中だったため、残された2つのエリアのゲストパーキングに駐車をしました。

本当は洗浄が終わった後に本来の駐車スペースに 戻さなくてはならなかったのですが、私の怠慢により、 移動せずにそのままにしてしまいました。

後でわかったことですが、この「ゲストパーキング」 は基本的に日をまたいで利用することはできず、日を またぐ際は許可証をもらわなくてはなりません。その ことを知らずに私は日をまたいでで駐車してしまったため、駐車違反となったのでした。

■ れらのことを振り返ってみたときに私にも 反省する点は多いことに気づかされました。

そもそも私は RAV 4 を運転させてもらえることに対する感謝が足りていませんでした。

冒頭で「私もハイランダーみたいな車がほしいな」とルディさんに話したと言いましたが、最初にルディさんと警察に盗難の届けを出しにいったときに、ルディさんがからかいながら「これでハイランダーが買えるかもね」と私に言いました。

このときにルディさんは既に私がRAV4を運転させてもらえることの感謝が足りていないことに気づいていたのだと思います。ルディさんからそのことを言われて私はハッとしました。

会員さんがよく私に岸田英山先生や清田先生がサンフランシスコの教会で解脱の布教をしていた時、ウインナー1本とご飯、そして少しの漬物を心からありがたくいただいていたという話を思い出し、それに比べて私は本当に未熟者だな…と痛感いたしました。

最初は、自分の住んでいるアパートの駐車場に止めておきながら違反で撤去されるのは理不尽な気もしましたが、知らなかったとはいえ、ルール違反をしたのは私です。これもすべて私の感謝不足とわがまま、つまり自我充実の心が作り出した結果だと受け取りました。すべては自業自得…。

人々は何か不幸が起こると、「神様が罰を与えた」と 考えがちですが、そうではなく、自分自身が神様、大 自然の法則から離れているから、このトラブルを招い たと捉えるところに解脱の教えがあるのだと思いま す。

さらに以前も車で人にぶつけてしまった経験もありますし、交通に関係する出来事は感謝不足だという話も聞いたことがあります。今回の出来事をきちんと反省して、ないものを求めるのではなく、今あるものに感謝をすること、その基本を忘れずに身を引きしめて頑張っていきたい

と思います。

I thank God for life, for my wife and family. I thank God for giving the intellect to Gedatsu Kongo. I thank Gedatsu Kongo for the teaching. And I thank my parents for finding Gedatsu.
