Gedatsu Q&A - Part 14

Q Will God help us when we pray?

A Master Gedatsu Kongo stated:

"When and wherever a sincere prayer is offered, through the grace and compassion of God, regardless of any human sufferings and diseases, these will be resolved completely. This is really a wonder."

Therefore, it can be said that God will help us when we sincerely pray to Him. However, it does not mean that God will fulfill whatever we want when we pray. We should understand this point clearly.

God permeates the universe and is always working. The movement of celestial bodies, four seasonal changes, growth of plants and animals, our heartbeat, digestion of food, etc. --- these are all the workings of God. Thus, God always works and allows everything in the universe to exist. We are already blessed by God as long as we exist. When we appreciate the blessings of God and live according with His will, we will be guided towards a life of joy and happiness.

We should understand that our present existence is already the blessing of God. Therefore, we should be grateful for being alive. When we sincerely pray to God with appreciation, we will be protected and guided by God most appropriately. We will then be able to attain true peace and happiness.

Q Why should we study Gedatsu?

A Gedatsu is the path of peace and happiness for everyone. We humans are more or less egotistical. This selfish attitude causes various sufferings and conflicts with other people. In order to avoid troubles and conflicts with others and to live happily, we should examine ourselves deeply and be aware of our selfishness.

If we look deeply into our existence, we become aware that our existence is not possible without many blessings from everything on earth. First, our life is not created by our own will. It is a gift from God, or the Universal Life, through our parents and ancestors. In our daily lives, we consume many things. We breathe the air, drink water, receive sunlight, live in a house, drive a car, etc. Thus, our everyday life is already a blessing of everything in the universe.

When we become aware of this, we will naturally feel grateful to all people and things for their blessings and start to live a life of appreciation and gratitude. We will then be more considerate of others. This realization will lead everyone to true happiness. This is the Gedatsu life.

Q What benefit do we gain through studying Gedatsu?

A The benefit you can gain through studying Gedatsu is untold. But this does not mean that you can get whatever you want if you study Gedatsu.

This is the path towards our true happiness and prosperity.

We can learn and acquire this secret of happiness through studying Gedatsu.







First Annual *Ryujin* Festival Honors the Great Water Dragon Guardian of Hawaiian Islands

In June, under the brilliant blue skies of Honolulu and in the serene oceanfront garden setting of the Gedatsu Church of Hawaii, members and friends gathered in June to offer prayers of appreciation for the blessings of water and protections they receive from the great water dragon guardian, *Ame-Hachidai-Ryu-Oujin*.*

Ryu-Oujin, or the great dragon gods, are recognized as divine gods who control the function of water in the heavens and the earth, serving the supreme god of the universe and working to protect all creatures on earth.

Master Gedatsu Kongo recognized Ame Hachidai Ryu-Oujin as the divine protector of the Hawaiian Islands. Its importance to the Hawaii Church is indicated by its enshrinement next to the Universal Life Force, Tenjinchigi, on the church altar, which was done under the direction of the late Tekenori Okano sensei.

Led by **Rev. Kazuo Yamada**, the ceremony inaugurated the *Ryujin* Festival as an annual church event. While reciting the Heart Sutra and offering holy tea blessing for all spirits connected to the Hawaiian Islands, members sprinkled holy tea throughout the grounds, praying for the purification and happiness of all spirits.

In his remarks, Rev. Yamada stressed the important and special role of the Gedatsu Church of Hawaii in honoring the great guardian deity of Hawaii.

* The guardian spirit is also enshrined in the pond on the *Goreichi* grounds of the Sacramento Spiritual Center. The various spellings of the water dragon gods refer to their many types and unique names.

"The *Ryujin* guardian moves freely throughout the heavens and the earth, creating the atmospheric flow of moving clouds, blowing winds and rains," Rev. Yamada said. "In this way, *Ryujin* contributes to the continual enrichment and development of the earth. Therefore, our very existence and spiritual growth as human beings depend on the critical role played by *Ryujin*.

"By honoring *Ryujin* and paying respect to its natural powers, its divine spirit has been activated in our lives. With its support, whatever we attempt to do can be achieved more easily and speedily and with more positive outcomes. When we put forth effort in our activities and work for the well-being of others, we will be supported by the dragon gods.

"Now that we have inaugurated an annual *Ryujin* Festival, I expect the guidance and protection from the dragon gods will become stronger and clearer."

Extraordinary Gifts Benefit L.A. and Sacramento Churches, Members

Our L.A. and Sacramento churches are the recipients of major donations totaling more than \$220,000 by Senior Reverend Akira Sebe and Senior Deacon Jackson Ito. Each benefactor donated 1,000 shares of stock last year to the church's Heizaburo Kobayashi Memorial Fund – when each gift was valued at \$173,000 – stipulating that the stock be sold when share values reached \$210,000. That was reached in June.

Of his \$210,000 gift, Rev. Sebe wishes to allocate \$100,000 to the L.A. Church general fund "in appreciation to the L.A. Church and members for the kindness and support he and his family received during the lean years of the church." He also allocates \$50,000 each to both Sacramento and L.A. churches for repairs and improvements and \$10,000 for the U.S.-born Minister Endowment Fund.

Of his \$210,000 gift, Jackson requests that \$100,000 be allocated to the Sacramento Church general fund, \$100,000 for the *Goreichi* Care Fund to purchase a tractor and for repairs and improvements of the Sacramento Spiritual Center, and \$10,000 for the U.S.-born Minister Endowment Fund.

"Our Gedatsu Church is truly humbled and honored to receive these extraordinary gifts," said Joyce Reid, chair of the Board of Directors. "We value the trust that Rev. Sebe and Deacon Ito have placed in us and promise to use these transformational gifts in accord with their hearts and wishes."

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The *Gedatsu Companion* is published monthly for members like **Yuri Elvin** of the L.A. Gedatsu Church. A noted, prolific artist, Yuri works in the entertainment industry, and his artworks appear in set decorations for TV and film, as well as in private collections and commissions.

Deeply sensitive to the movement of spirits, Yuri was introduced to Gedatsu 15 years ago after an impactful spiritual experience. "The lessons, philosophy and holy tea changed my life," says Elvin. "Gedatsu has shown me how to have gratitude, control of my life and peace."
