Aztec Dance Troupe



This summer, the Sacramento Spiritual Center hosted a vibrant cultural ceremony of Indigenous Mexican Peoples, showcasing the Aztec Dance Troupe of Sacramento, a group of 50 young men and women, trained in dance based on ancient Aztec cultural traditions. The troupe was invited to perform on the *Goreichi* grounds by **Ministertrainee Mica Rodriguez**, who is, herself, trained in Aztec dance.

"I believe there is a strong affinity between our Gedatsu community and the Aztec dance circle," says Mica. "We share respect and appreciation for the Universal Life Force, ancestral spirits, humankind's relationship with the natural world, the seasonal changes, and cultural traditions."

In photos at right, in the celebration of indigenous Mexican customs, the dance rituals demand discipline and endurance, as the dancers, dressed in ancient traditional apparel, move in step with complicated patterns and rhythms.

At bottom, altar offerings of furs, pottery and photos honor ancestors and show appreciation for blessings from the Universal Life Force and the earth.

Gedatsu Q&A – Part 18

Q What is the significance of the Spring and Fall Grand Festivals?

A Gedatsu Spring and Fall Grand Festivals are two of the most important events that Gedatsu members should attend. We observe the Grand Festivals in order to thank the Universal Life Force and all spirits for the great blessings we receive from them.

We all receive immeasurable blessings from all elements in the universe that sustain our lives each day. While we are usually not aware of these blessings and tend to take them for granted, it is very important to acknowledge the greatness of the blessings we receive from the universe each day and express our gratitude.

In his speech at the Grand Festivals, **Master Gedatsu Kongo** often stated:

"Everyone, from all parts of the country, congratulations on your attendance at this Grand Festival! I will not say 'thank you' for coming, because this Festival is not held for me. Rather, it is held for your own happiness."

We should learn from these words that appreciation and gratitude is the key to our true happiness and prosperity.

Q What is the significance of the monthly Appreciation Service?

A The Appreciation Service is held each month at our Gedatsu churches. It is one of the most important events of church. Gedatsu members are encouraged to attend this service each month to express sincere appreciation for the great blessings they receive from the Universal Life Force, all spirits, all people and things on earth.

The most important part of the monthly Appreciation Service is the Opening Prayer. Members should join the prayer to sincerely express their gratitude to the Universal Life Force and all spirits for their blessings. That is why Master Gedatsu Kongo always encouraged members not to be late for the starting time of the service.

You can listen to ministers' sermons at the monthly service to learn the path of happiness. It is also important to communicate with other church members and enjoy church activities.

Think of yourself not as a guest, but rather, as someone who will create a better place for yourself and others to gain happiness by learning the Gedatsu teaching.

Q How can I explain Gedatsu to my friends?

A While this is an important question for Gedatsu members, it is not necessary to get into a deep, serious explanation about Gedatsu. Instead, you can introduce Gedatsu by saying the following.

We are all allowed to exist by the grace of a Universal Life Force and receive immeasurable blessings from all elements in the universe. It is important for us to be aware of this fact and be thankful for all people and things on earth. This sense of appreciation and gratitude is the key to our true happiness. This is what we Gedatsu members learn and practice.

Gedatsu is the path of happiness for everyone. It is a non-sectarian study. We respect all traditions and appreciate the common ground of all religions. Anyone can join and study Gedatsu regardless of any religious faith they may have.

Major financial support from Senior Reverend Akira Sebe and Senior Deacon Jackson Ito earlier this year has enabled the Sacramento Spiritual Center and Los Angeles Church to make significant purchases – like those described below – to enhance and upgrade our church facilities and grounds.



A heavy-duty, multi-utility tractor has been the dream of the Sacramento church for many years. That dream has now been fulfilled with the purchase of a John Deere tractor (with tiller, forklift, posthole digger), a versatile workhorse that can perform the many tasks needed on the *Goreichi* grounds. The tractor will be stored in the 384-square-foot shed, newly built by member John Horner.



A shiny, finishing touch to the many improvement projects conducted this summer at the Los Angeles Gedatsu Church is the purchase of a commercial-grade gas range in the newly floored kitchen. With six burners, griddle and double ovens, the church is ready to handle the food-preparation needs for church fundraisers and other functions.

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The Gedatsu Companion is published monthly for members like June Hayashi of the Gedatsu Church of Hawaii. June and her husband, Larry, have three children, nine grandchildren and three dogs. In her spare time, she enjoys "a little crocheting of baby blankets and a lot of crossword puzzles."

Things Are as We Make Them By Archbishop Eizan Kishida

When we give deep thought into any adverse situation, we will always discover a way to change unhappiness into happiness. In this way, we can accept all things gratefully.

Just as strenuous physical activity builds a strong body, when we endure hardships in life and surpass them with enthusiasm, our mental and spiritual powers increase. No matter what obstacles and hardships confront us in our everyday living, when we take full responsibility to solve them, without attempting to escape from them or become indignant toward them and consider them to be a means for our spiritual development, there will always be a solution.

Some people place material wealth as the sole object of happiness, but this is because of their lack of spiritual wealth. Happiness and security dependent only upon material things are only temporary and may be lost at any moment.

Even the most ordinary routines, if performed repeatedly, will become extraordinary acts. Luster is produced through repetition of the same motion. Wood, metal, or a diamond will show its luster to the extent it is polished.

Likewise, when we become aware that our daily life is a place of spiritual training, and are consciously accumulating good deeds, we will experience a bright and joyous existence.
