# Learn Chado - the Ancient Japanese "Way of Tea"

Sacramento members, **Ritsuko Nakatani** and **Jessica Scott**, are offering a unique opportunity to savor the spirit of Japanese culture. They invite members and friends to join them to learn the ancient Japanese art of the tea ceremony, known as *Chado*, or the "way of tea."

Tea ceremony classes are held at the Sacramento Spiritual Center on the fourth Sunday of each month at 11:30 a.m., immediately following the Appreciation Service. Classes are open to those seven years and older. Enrollment is free, and attendance on a drop-in basis is welcome. This is a beginner-level class, but additional instruction for intermediate practitioners is also available. Health protocols will be observed.

The Proper Attitude for the Saito Goma Fire Ceremony
A message from Senior Rev. Akira Sebe

Master Gedatsu Kongo often told members that prior to the Grand Festivals on the *Goreichi* grounds in Japan, he sensed the tremendous gathering of souls, who eagerly awaited the event. The same is true of the souls that await our own Grand Festivals on our *Goreichi* sacred grounds at the Sacramento Spiritual Center.

Therefore, in anticipation of the gathering of souls at our Spring Festival in April, Senior Reverend Akira Sebe asks us to maintain the proper attitude when observing the *Saito Goma* Fire Ceremony – whether or not we will be in attendance.

Many members order *Saito Goma* plaques, but for various reasons may not be able to attend the ceremony in person. In those cases, their plaques will be thrown into the fire by a participant.

"If you ordered plaques but cannot physically attend the *Saito Goma* service, it is okay," says Rev. Sebe. "However, it is important to realize that because you placed your plaque order, the souls and wishes connected with your plaques will be at *Goreichi*, eagerly awaiting your prayers of appreciation when they are offered to the fire. Therefore, your plaque order is not to be taken lightly, with the thought that someone in Sacramento will simply take care of it.

"Instead, at the very time of the ceremony, sincerely pray at your home altar or wherever you may be, and offer the Heart Sutra, or *Hannya Shingyo*, for the souls and wishes for which you applied and in appreciation for being able to participate in the ceremony. Otherwise, even though your plaques are thrown into the ceremonial fire, positive outcomes will not result from them."

# Gedatsu Q&A - Part 21

- Q In our Gedatsu study, ministers advise us to reflect within ourselves first. I just want to live a life that will lead to happiness. Why should I self-reflect?
- A When we have problems in our relationships with other people, we tend to criticize them. This seldom leads to any resolution of the problems. Think about yourself. When someone criticizes your faults, can you easily accept their criticism and change your attitude? It must be very hard for anyone to do that. Even when we are wrong, we don't want to accept other people's criticisms about us. It is only when someone admits their faults and apologizes for them, do we feel like admitting our faults and changing our attitude. This is human nature.

Human relationships are like a reflection in a mirror. It is hard to change another person's attitude by criticizing them. But we can change ourselves. This is the first step toward improving our relationships with others, and ultimately, to changing the world. When we reflect on ourselves and try to correct our wrong attitude, the rest of the world will begin changing accordingly.

Gedatsu is the study about oneself, not about others. Self-reflection is the direct path toward achieving our true happiness.

- Q When I go to church, ministers advise me to study and practice this and that. I feel confused. Do I really have to do that many things in Gedatsu?
- **A** Gedatsu is a simple path. Gedatsu is, to be succinct, to respect the Universal Life Force and ancestors, and appreciate their blessings. This is everything about Gedatsu.

Please think about your life today. You are alive now, but it's not you who created your life. You were born from your parents and ancestors. Your heart keeps beating constantly. Who allows your heart to beat? It's not you, but the Universal Life Force that makes your heart beat.

In our daily lives, we consume many things. We eat meals, breathe the air, drink water, etc. They are all provided by many people and things in the universe. Thanks to these immeasurable blessings, we are able to sustain our life every day. Without these blessings, it is impossible for us to live a single day. But we usually take it for granted.

This is why it is important to respect and thank the Universal Life Force and ancestors for their blessings. This realization is the key for everyone to live a happy life. Gedatsu is to become aware of this fact of our life and appreciate the immeasurable blessings. As a token of appreciation, we should then try to benefit the world through our daily duties and activities. This is the Gedatsu path, which will lead to happiness and prosperity.

Everything we study and practice in Gedatsu is only for this purpose. Please understand this clearly and try to practice this simple path each day. You will then be able to live a happy and meaningful life. This is the true study and practice of Gedatsu.

Q I have learned that we should thank ancestors for their blessings. But I cannot see my ancestors physically. Why should I be thankful for them?

A In Japanese, we have a word, "Okagesama," which literally means something hidden or unseen. This word says that our present existence is due to the help and support of many people and things that we usually take for granted.

Imagine a big tree. You can see its big trunk, branches and green leaves. But, when you closely observe the tree, you see that its existence is possible because of the earth, moisture, air, sunlight, etc. The important part of the tree is the root, which is in the earth and cannot be seen. But without the roots, the tree cannot take water and nourishment from the soil. The big tree is standing solidly on the ground because it has spread deep roots. A tree is nurtured and supported by these unseen elements.

The same can be said about yourself. Master Gedatsu Kongo explained this as the teaching of appreciation and requital. We receive immeasurable blessings from our country, parents, teachers, society, and all creation in the universe. We should appreciate these blessings and, as a token of appreciation, we should try to benefit the world and work for world peace.

We should be especially aware of the immeasurable blessings we receive from our ancestors. We have parents. Our parents have their parents, and so on. Our life is the fruit of this unbroken chain of life since far back in time. If there were a single break in this chain, we could not be here today.

The souls of our ancestors cannot be seen. However, they are always with us, watching and guiding us from the spiritual world. Please do not forget the great blessings you have received from your ancestors. Ancestors are our roots. Without roots, a tree cannot grow and prosper. We have to nourish and water the roots to have the tree grow. Similarly, when you deeply appreciate your ancestors' blessings, you will be happy and prosperous.

We annually observe the *Higan* and *Obon* services at our Gedatsu Church. These events are special times to remember our roots and appreciate their blessings.

- Iron corrodes by its own rust. Humans go to wrack and ruin by their own immorality.
- Don't think too much. Practice Gedatsu immediately, and everything will go smoothly.
- Gedatsu is not another's matter. It is all your own.
- If you feel uneasy about your future without stepping firmly on the present situation, you create unnecessary anxiety.
- Do not chase your past. Appreciate your ancestors and respect your country. Stand firmly on the present moment and try your best to create the future. Your efforts will bear fruit in time.
