- When you study and practice Gedatsu sincerely, you will be free from the fear of death.
- Everyone lives every day. However, if you do not know how you should live, you are like a living corpse.
- Sour speech and action.
- Be kind to everyone. This attitude will lead to your happy and prosperous life.
- Every evening before going to bed, reflect deeply on what you have done during the day and vow to yourself to live better tomorrow.
- I don't care for daydreamers. There are many dreamers in the world, but they are far less important than doers.
- When a string becomes tangled-up, find the knot to be loosened. You will then be able to disentangle the string.
- Hell and paradise are our minds' creation.
- If you always grumble and complain about life, why don't you quit being a human?
- If you deeply examine yourself, you won't complain about life. You think too highly of yourself. That is why you are always grumbling.
- Our mouths are the passageway for our minds to express.
- When you make a mistake, apologize and correct the error promptly.
- Hope in the morning, effort during the day, and appreciation in the evening this is Gedatsu life.
- Karma should not be a cause of pessimism and despair. Why don't you make it useful? When you are faced with adversity, make use of the adverse circumstances to change your life positively.
- Why don't you scrutinize yourself thoroughly before criticizing others? By ignoring your own meanness, how can you point out the meanness of others?
- Once you open your spiritual eye, you will find this world is filled with many beautiful things.

Gedatsu Q&A - Part 27

Q Whenever I go to church, I've tried to practice Hiho meditation, but I really do not understand why I should perform the meditation. What is the significance of Hiho meditation and its method?

A When we perform the *Hiho* Meditation, we hold the Holy *Hiho* between our palms. The Holy *Hiho* is a symbol of the Universal Life Force, which **Master Gedatsu Kongo** inscribed with his holy spiritual power. Therefore, to hold the Holy *Hiho* means that we leave everything to the Holy *Hiho*, or the Universal Life. This attitude of total surrender is the most important aspect of the Holy *Hiho* Meditation practice.

Our mind and physical body are not separate. Therefore, when we perform meditation, we should be mindful of our physical posture. We should sit in an upright manner, with our back straight, but relaxing our shoulders and arms. When we sit on a chair, we do not lean on the back. We breathe naturally through our nostrils.



When we perform meditation, we don't have to think of anything. We should try not to imagine anything in our mind, except keeping our physical posture in an upright manner and concentrating on our breathing. We will then be properly adjusted mentally and physically by the power of the Holy *Hiho*, or the Universal Life. This is *Hiho* Meditation. In the course of our daily lives, when we see and hear something, we instantly label it with our thoughts and feelings at that moment: "This is good. "He is wrong." "I like this." "I don't like that person." And so on.

However, we should understand that these instant judgments result from our egotistical thoughts and feelings. Regularly practicing *Hiho* Meditation enables us to release ourselves from self-centered judgments and to see things without ego-centered labeling.

When we perform *Hiho* Meditation, we leave everything to the Holy *Hiho* and concentrate on our breathing. We should try not to think of anything but breathing naturally and focusing our attention on the *way* we breathe.



Meditation is to release our thoughts and return to our reality – the present moment. How do we do this? The answer is, through practice. Because our thoughts arise from our ego, it is very hard for us to correct our egotistical thoughts and attitude. Egoism cannot correct egoism.

The *Hiho* Meditation is not a matter of our thoughts. It is a matter of our practice. When we perform meditation, we shouldn't try to correct our egotistical attitude. Rather, our main focus is to keep our physical posture in an upright position and breathe naturally. Concentrate on our breathing. When stray thoughts arise in our mind, we let them go and we concentrate on our breathing again.

We repeat this until the end of the meditation session. In doing this, our mental and physical state will be appropriately adjusted through the power of the Holy *Hiho*, or the power of the Universal Life.

The restorative power of the Holy *Hiho* is truly miraculous – beyond our intellectual understanding. The work of the Holy *Hiho* can only be fully understood through actual practice. The same is true of our everyday life. Master Gedatsu Kongo always stated, "Gedatsu should be practiced in your everyday life." When you leave everything to the Universal Life Force and do your best in your duties, you will be guided most appropriately and will be able to live fully.

Every time you come to church, please take time to practice the *Hiho* Meditation. If you continue to practice the meditation, you will unknowingly be free from egoism and will be able to judge things in a right manner. This is the significance of *Hiho* meditation.

Q I pray every morning. How do I know if my prayers are received and if they will be granted?

A Many years ago, one of my friends who is Catholic sent me the message that appears at the right. I still keep it in mind and sometimes read the message. I believe this message perfectly explains how our prayers are granted.

These words reminded me that the Divine Will is something unfathomable to us. It is so profound that we humans cannot imagine it. We may feel happy when we have happy events. When something goes wrong with us, we may suffer. This is natural for human beings. But we should understand that the Divine Will is far beyond our thoughts and feelings. The Divine Love may sometimes not look favorable to us. However, through difficulties and hardships, the Universal Life will ultimately allow every one of us to attain happiness. I believe the Divine Love is something like this.

God said, No. It is not for me to take away, but for you to give it up.

I asked God to make my handicapped child whole. God said, No. His spirit is whole, his body is only temporary.
